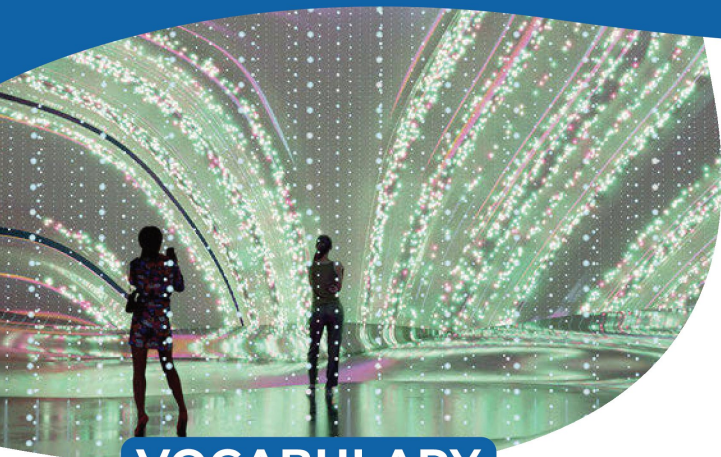

Four artists talk about their work

A Lee Baxter

I recognised my gift for art as a young child, messing about with the tools at hand: pencils, crayons, poster paint, etc. Life without the ability to paint seems unimaginable, and inspiration can come from anywhere — from an image that appears in a dream to the endless variety of the clouds above. Then I'll be in a rush to grab my paints to depict what's inspired me. There are also spells of far less intense inactivity, which many artists go through, just waiting to spark up again. I'm a simple person when it comes to what I do, totally at ease sharing it with others. That's what exhibitions are for, as well as an opportunity to show it to buyers — I need an income! But it's also about letting people have their own reactions to each work. Maybe it gets the seal of approval, maybe they pick it apart. I don't take things personally because art's terribly subjective. And if I fretted about things like whether the subjects of my paintings are hackneyed or groundbreaking, it'd hold me back.

B Toni Saccheri

As an experimental artist, I create sound installations. It's a less conventional form of art, which I explore with the curiosity of a scientist. For me it's vital to do that. I want to question traditional music structures. I'm fascinated by the qualities of noise, of silence, of almost everything we hear. To create something absolutely unique, it's necessary to undo adult preconceptions. You need an urge to go back to the mindset you had before all those assumptions set in. Creating something completely novel is central to my work. Putting my creations on public display for the first time was an unsettling experience though. I had the perfect venue, a spacious contemporary art space typically frequented by art enthusiasts from all over, but the whole thing was a total flop. Very few people showed up, and those that did just didn't seem to get what my work's all about. It took a while to come back from that, and I've gradually developed a thicker skin for similar occasions.

C Charlie Rockwell

I discovered technology for creating art digitally when I was about ten, and I've been doing it ever since. By my senior year of high school, it was obvious that I loved digital drawing too much not to pursue it as a career. In fact, it's turned out to be fairly lucrative, perhaps because I've got a good grasp of how to exploit social media to publicise my work, and I exhibit on a variety of platforms. To be honest, spending hours on the promotional side of things can get a bit tedious, but it really pays off. There's plenty of scope for imagination in what I do, as it's not just geometric shapes and fantasy worlds that I draw. I do think originality can be a bit overrated sometimes, and creating a vision of something pleasing to the eye that you might want to decorate your home with is more what I'm into. My greatest inspiration seems to come when I'm doing menial tasks like mopping the floor. Maybe, it's a process of letting go and not forcing it.

D Ash Osman

Whether it's a photo, a painting, a sculpture, or any other type of art, it must have something to say, or by definition, it's meaningless. Painting is my chosen medium, and I've never got so caught up in the mechanics of it that I've ended up creating something pointless. As I drift off to sleep, I imagine myself in front of my latest project, closing my eyes and visualising what I'm working on. I tend to employ this technique particularly when there's a problem I've got to work out, like how to convey my message more effectively, and the next day I've often found a solution. Most people think art's merely a matter of slapping paint on canvas, when, in fact, creating it consumes your whole mind, and all your energy. When you put your work out there, and you have to make a living, you confront the reality that not everybody understands your art. What I might view as my greatest achievements aren't necessarily the ones the public go for.

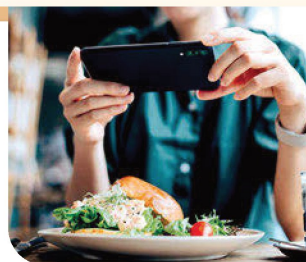
