Four professionals talk about how their career ambitions changed

Until I was eight, my family lived directly under the flight path of a nearby airport and I'd often stand watching planes being launched into the sky above my head. Back then, there was never any question of me becoming anything other than a pilot and that remained unchanged for many years. It wasn't until I took my first flight as a passenger when I was a young adult that my dreams of living a life in the skies were torn apart. The inside of the cabin was barely as comfortable as an inter-city bus, and the pilot was simply a driver, transporting people from A to B. To say I was disappointed is an understatement. I'd poured my heart and soul into studying the physics of flying and the mechanics of planes. There was nothing for it but to apply all that to the next best thing, and I embarked on what has since become a highly satisfying career as an aircraft engineer.

I saw a documentary about psychologists once as a teenager and instantly knew it was the role for me, convinced I was highly intuitive and could read people like books. I'd even practise my 'personality readings' on friends. It was much later before it clicked that they had simply been indulging me, that I possessed no extraordinary aptitude for understanding the way in which people's minds worked. That was compounded by achieving only mediocre results in psychology assignments at college, despite my keen efforts. As many of the older students are about to start considering their career options, it would be of huge benefit to them to learn about the kinds of jobs that are out there and how they might take appropriate steps to securing a position in their chosen field.

The computer room is often free all day on Mondays, and this would be the perfect opportunity for students to use the available resources. There could be teacher-guided sessions, where students are given helpful tasks, such as completing questionnaires about their strengths and weaknesses, or personality quizzes.

Students may not have a good knowledge of the kinds of jobs that ordinary people do, and many are already focussing their ambitions on exciting-sounding roles such as social media influencer or footballer. With help focussing on their individual skills and qualities, they might discover less popular and competitive jobs that are equally interesting, which would bring about a dramatic change in their thinking.

Having time to explore career options with professional help from a teacher or other experienced adult will certainly be of value to students who do not have a clear direction to work towards. Missing a day of ordinary classes will be a small price to pay for being better prepared for life beyond school.

To sum up, offering students the chance to consider their future working life during a work research day would give them a clearer picture of how to go about finding the role that is right for them.

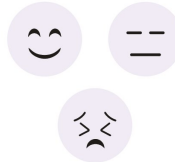
