



#### IN THE FUTURE, WE WON'T NEED TEACHERS

Over the last 20 years, the Internet has developed to such a degree that soon most subjects we want to study will be available to us online. We can already attend MOOCs and watch videos of lectures taking place at some of the most prestigious universities in the world. We can do the follow-up reading and listen to the lecture as many times as we want. All of this is available 24 hours a day, and it's free of charge.

We can also access micro-teaching, where short clips and texts are posted online. These small chunks of information allow us to learn at our own pace at a rate we can cope with. Most Internet pages are also translated these days, so if we want to compare a text in two languages, we can. Likewise, if we want a video to be subtitled, that is often possible, too.

With all this information continuously available free of charge, it will be easier for all of us to learn online. This is particularly useful for people in remote regions who cannot attend schools or colleges or for people who for other reasons cannot travel for their education.

The idea of lifelong learning is that we never stop developing and learning new content and skills. Thanks to the Internet, we can still grow and learn without a formal classroom.
