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ntroduction

Who is Linguaskill Trainer for?

This book is suitable for anyone who is preparing to take the Linguaskill test. Linguaskill is recognised by public and private schools across the world who wish to employ English teachers and as an entrance exam for Higher Education institutes. It is also recognised by employers across the world, particularly in the airline and banking industries. Currently, it is recognised by more than 1,500 organisations as proof of a candidate's ability to communicate effectively in English. Linguaskill Trainer is designed both for self-study or to be used by teachers for preparing students for the test. All users can access or download a variety of support materials via an access code on the inside front cover for our Cambridge One online platform, such as answer keys, audio files and transcripts, and an eBook.

What is Linguaskill Trainer?

Linguaskill Trainer contains six authentic practice tests for the test, covering the four modules that form the complete test: Reading, Listening, Speaking and Writing. The first two tests in the Trainer are 'guided tests', which means they include extra training and information to familiarise you with each part of the test, what it tests and the skills and kinds of language that can help you to complete the exam tasks successfully. Tests 3 to 6 are purely practice tests. All six tests cover the different question types you may encounter and are true to the tasks you will meet on the test.

In Test 1, each part of each of the modules is introduced separately in the form of a **Training** section and an **Exam Practice** section. The **Training** sections give key information about each part of the test in the **Task Information**, and have advice and guidance to help you understand what each task is testing, alongside exercises that will build the language and skills directly relevant to each.

An **Exam Practice** section follows each **Training** section. Authentic versions of each task are accompanied by an **Action Plan**, which gives step-by-step guidance on how to approach the task, alongside tips on general exam strategy. For the Reading and Listening exam tasks, there is also **Advice** linked to specific questions, providing hints and clues to guide you through your first exposure to the tasks.

Test 2 follows a similar pattern to Test 1 in that it also consists of **Training** and **Exam Practice** sections to review and further develop important skills, language and exam task familiarity. The **Exam Practice** section follows the same format as Test 1, with the exception of the **Action Plan**, which is simply referenced.

Tests 3 to 6 are complete practice tests without advice or training. They give you the opportunity to put into practice the skills, language and strategies you have acquired while working through Tests 1 and 2.

All tests have an Explanatory Answer Key (see next section).

Features of Linguaskill Trainer

- An **Explanatory Answer Key** is available for download via the Cambridge One online platform. It is 'explanatory' in the sense that it not only provides you with the correct answers for the tests, but also, where relevant, explains why the answers are correct and why other options are not.
- For Writing tasks, the Explanatory Answer Key provides Model Answers for you to compare your answers with notes on how the model was put together.
- A Listening Transcript is also provided via Cambridge One for all audio tracks in the Training as well as for the Listening exam tasks themselves.
- Full **Downloadable Audio** is available for all tracks, covering both the Listening exam tasks and Listening and Speaking Training sections.
- An Interactive eBook Version of the print book is also available via the code in the print book, allowing online access via our Cambridge One platform. All audio tracks are included in the eBook.

How to use Linguaskill Trainer

Test 1 Training

- For each module, you should begin by studying the **Task Information**, which provides an overview of each part and, depending on the task, covers key information, such as the task description, task style, duration and timings, rules to observe during the test and even the skills and language that will aid in its completion.
- Throughout Test 1 Training, you will also find information marked **Tip!** These tips relate to both specific aspects of the Training and more generic practical information to help you understand completely the tasks you will face in the actual test.
- The exercises in the Training cover skills and language that will help you deal with all the practice tests in this book as well as the actual test itself.
- The answers to all the Training exercises are included in the **Explanatory Answer Key**, and just like the answers for the practice tests themselves, are, where required, detailed to the extent that they not only provide the correct answers, but also explanations as to why other answers or approaches are incorrect.

Test 1 Exam Practice

- Start by looking at the **Action Plan**, which gives you a set of recommendations of how best to deal with each exam part or task on the day of the test itself. Depending on the task/part, you may even get pointers on what to do BEFORE, DURING or AFTER the task.
- Then look at the practice exam task itself. For receptive skill tasks (Reading and Listening) you will find **Advice** sections, which provide hints on what to look/listen for in each question in the task. For productive skills (Writing and Speaking), there are more **Tips!** which point out aspects of the specific task you should be aware of. Such **Tips!** will commonly refer to points covered in the preceding Training sections as well as covering general FAQs (Frequently Asked Questions) that candidates have about the test.
- As ever, the downloadable Explanatory Answer Key will provide not only correct answers, but also explanations as to why they are correct and other options are not, or a model text in the case of the Writing module. Note that a model answer is not provided for the Speaking module.

Test 2 Training and Exam Practice

- The Test 2 Training and Exam Practice build on, develop, extend and review what has been covered in Test 1.
- The same features are present such as **Tip!** and **Advice** to guide you through the new exam task being practised but note that some sections such as **Task Information** and **Action Plan** are not repeated.

Tests 3 to 6 Exam Practice

- In Tests 3, 4, 5 and 6 you should apply the skills, techniques, strategies, and language you have practised in Tests 1 and 2.
- You can do the tests in any order, but you are encouraged to stick to the time recommendations, in order to better recreate exam conditions when practising. Note that unlike other exams Linguaskill is adaptive. This means that you may not see all the question types in the test that you will see in this book. However, you will see all question types here to make sure that you are ready for the test. Please also note each test gets harder here as you progress.
- It will be easier to keep to the exam instructions and recreate exam conditions if you can find somewhere quiet to work, and if you give yourself enough time to do each module in its entirety. That said, it is perfectly feasible to take a bite-size approach and break down the different skills into individual tasks.

Overview of Linguaskill skills and question types

Listening

The tasks consist of shorter and longer listening texts (max 59 minutes).

One-Question Multiple Choice – The candidate listens to a monologue or dialogue and answers one question by choosing the sentence or phrase that most closely matches the meaning of the text. Each question has three different options

Five-Question Multiple Choice 5 items – The candidate listens to a monologue or dialogue and answers five questions by choosing the sentence or phrase that most closely matches the meaning of the text. The question has four different options

Two-Question Multiple Choice 2 items – The candidate listens to a monologue or dialogue and answers two questions by choosing the sentence or phrase that most closely matches the meaning of the text. Each question has three different options

Sentence Completion 5 items – The candidate listens to a monologue and completes five gapped sentences. Each gap can be completed with up to three words from the listening or their synonyms.

One-Task Multiple Matching – The candidate listens to five different speakers talking for approximately 30 seconds each. There is one question for all five speakers and the candidate must choose the correct answer for each speaker from eight options.

Two-Task Multiple Matching 2 questions – The candidate listens to three different speakers talking for approximately 30–40 seconds each. There are two questions for all three speakers and the candidate must choose the correct answer for each speaker from five options per question.

Note that in the test you will hear all recordings twice.

Reading

The tasks consist of shorter and longer reading texts (max 59 minutes).

Read and select – The candidate reads some graphical information and chooses the sentence or phrase that most closely matches the meaning of the text. There are three options.

Gapped sentences – The candidate reads a sentence with a gap and chooses the correct word to fill the gap.

Multiple-choice gap-fill – The candidate chooses the right word or phrase to fill the gaps in a text. There are three or four choices for each gap.

Open gap-fill – The candidate completes a text with five gaps. Each gap is to be filled with a single grammatical word.

Extended reading – The candidate reads a longer text and answers a series of multiple-choice questions. The questions are in the same order as the information in the text.

Gapped texts – The candidate reads a longer text from which five sentences or paragraphs have been removed. They fill each gap in the text by choosing from the six sentence options or eight paragraph options.

Multiple matching – The candidate reads across four texts to find relevant information to match to prompts or questions.

Speaking: 15 minutes (5 assessed parts)

The Speaking module is taken using a computer with a microphone and headphones. Questions are presented to the candidate through the computer screen and headphones, and their responses are recorded.

Linguaskill Speaking is assessed by using human examiners and market-leading auto-marking technology, known as hybrid marking. Speaking results will be released when ready and within 48 hours. Typically, 90% of results are available within 12 hours.

Writing: 45 minutes (1 task)

The Writing module asks candidates to input answers using a computer keyboard. Answers are marked by an examiner. Writing results will be released 3 to 5 days after the test date.

Essay – the candidate reads a statement about a topic. This statement is called the proposition statement, and it states a view on the topic. The candidate indicates in their response the extent to which they agree with the proposition.

Additionally, the candidate is asked to discuss arguments for and against the proposition statement in their response. Three viewpoints on the topic are provided in the task input one 'for', one 'against', and one that may be for or against, but which introduces a different aspect of the topic. Candidates can choose to discuss and evaluate the viewpoints provided but they are also free to discuss other arguments for and against in their response.

Tip! You are given a sentence on the screen and in the recording that sets the context. It outlines who is speaking and what they are speaking about (e.g. 'Listen to two friends talking about the weekend.'). Make sure you pay attention to the context sentence as it will give you a better understanding of what you are about

Tip! Before you listen to the recording, try to predict the reasons or explanations the speakers might give for each option. It may help you to identify incorrect answers, as well as the correct one.

Remember!

The speakers won't use the same language that you read on the screen so try to predict other ways the statements in the options could be expressed.

Questions about agreement or disagreement are common in this part of the test, so listen closely to identify words and phrases

which indicate this.

Tip! In One-Question Multiple Choice, the speaker(s) will not necessarily refer to options A-C in the order they appear on screen, i.e. from top to bottom.

Remember!

The speakers may sometimes use negative language for agreement, e.g. A: 'I don't think there's anywhere better than this.' B: 'No, there really isn't.'

Tip! When the question asks you to identify the speaker's main point, it is important you listen to everything they say before choosing the correct option.



Don't try to listen for specific points of detail, because the question is testing your overall understanding of what you hear.

Tip! The speaker will introduce each new section with a paraphrase of the words in the question, e.g. 'So, how did I get into journalism?' in the audio, is a paraphrase for the question, 'What led to Paula's initial interest in becoming a journalist?'. Listening for these paraphrases will help you know when the next question is coming.
