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How to Use This Book

Each unit in **From Phonics to RT Second Edition** features target sounds with related words, a story, a connected reader's theater selection, and a review section that covers vocabulary, reading, speaking, and listening.



Unit Intro

In the **Introduction** section, students review target consonant and vowel-related sounds with a chant. They review the sounds with speaking activities. Students are then introduced to content words.



Reading

In the **Reading** section, students read a short story. The target phonics sounds are accented in the story.



Reader's Theater

In the **Reader's Theater** section, students get to perform the story as a drama presentation.



New Words for Practice

In the **New Words for Practice** section, students learn more words with the target phonics sounds.



Review

In the **Review** section, students review what they learned in the entire unit. This section reviews through reading, speaking, writing, and listening activities.

Phonics plays a significant role in how students learn to read. The author firmly believes that a hybrid approach of reinforcing phonics while introducing Reader's Theater will improve and further develop students' oral fluency.

The foundations of literacy begin with phonics. Phonics skills are essential in helping students read and spell. Through letter-sound recognition, students can decode words as they read. They can also spell them correctly. With this approach, learning new words becomes easier. Reader's Theater offers an entertaining way of improving fluency and comprehension.

- As a simplified form of drama, Reader's Theater needs no memorization of lines or preparation of scenery.
- It guides the audience to create an imaginary scene.
- Level-appropriate speaking parts are assigned, so everyone can have fun and succeed.
- Every student has a script that can be easily performed.


