

#### STUDENT BOOK

#### AUDIO QR

#### WARM UP

Students learn the unit key words and then perform definition matching and image matching activities to help strengthen memory retention and ensure they understand not only the words' meanings but also their usage in context.



#### **READING A**


Students read a level-appropriate passage about a familiar and interesting topic using the key words.


#### WORKBOOK




