Preface

What is Chinese?



How to say Chinese in Chinese?

China is a multi-ethnic country that consists of 56 ethnic groups. Among them, the Hànzú (汉族, Han people) accounts for 94% of the population of China, and the remaining 55 are ethnic minorities. Accordingly, the language spoken by the Hànzú, who make up the majority of the population, became the standard language, and it came to be called "Hànyǔ (汉语, the language of the Han people)." Foreigners also call it "Zhōngguóhuà (中国话)."

Chinese characters - Hànzì (汉字)

Hànzì is an ideograph. Characters do not stand for sounds but instead represent an idea. Therefore, for the word "木," although we may not be able to pronounce it, we understand its meaning to be "tree." Chinese characters used in several Asian countries, and those used in China have different shapes because the Chinese use Jiǎntǐzì (简体字, Simplified Chinese characters) for easy and convenient modification of the complex strokes of Fántǐzì (繁体字, Standard Chinese). However, Taiwan and Hong Kong still use Standard Chinese. That is, Jiǎntǐzì is a simplified version of Fántǐzì.

Pronunciation and Tones

The pronunciation of the Chinese language we are learning is written in "Hànyǔ Pīnyīn (汉语拼音, Chinese phonetic alphabet, Chinese Pinyin)." It is the Romanized spelling of the Chinese characters. And in Chinese, every character has a pitch, which is called "Shēngdiào (声调, tone)" There are four tones in Chinese.

Are you sure it's Chinese?

Each province in China has its own dialect called "Fāngyán (方言)." The Chinese dialects are so strong that sometimes people from different regions cannot communicate with each other at all.

So the Chinese government promotes the learning of Pǔtōnghuà (普通话), the official language of China in addition to their dialects. The Chinese language we are currently learning now is Pǔtōnghuà.

Word order in Chinese

One of the biggest differences between Korean, Japanese, and Chinese languages is the word order. Unlike Korean and Japanese, the basic word order in Chinese is "subject + predicate + object."
